

Twice the Wild started as a dream of doubling our conservation lands by 2025.

Thanks to you, we're looking forward to bringing it home and saving **30,000 acres** of Nova Scotia's best wild places.





In 2020, with the encouragement of amazing donors like you, the Nature Trust sensed it was time for something big. By then, we had grown from a small, fledging group of community members to become a leader in private land conservation, having worked since 1994 to acquire 15,000 acres of Nova Scotia's most important wild spaces and protect them forever.

So when the Federal government announced its own commitment to conserve 25% of land by 2025 along with a multi-billion dollar investment in conservation, we seized the opportunity and launched Twice the Wild, an ambitious campaign to double the acres of land under our care by 2025.

Thanks to your outpouring of support, we reached our initial Twice the Wild fundraising target of \$4 million in just over a year. We were then able to unlock four times that amount from key funding partners, providing a total of \$20 million for nature conservation in Nova Scotia!

Today, we are so pleased to report that your generous support of Twice the Wild has added 71 more properties to our conservation lands in priority areas such as the Mabou Highlands, the 100 Wild Islands and the St. Mary's River. You've helped save critical coastlines, build assemblages of old and unique forest, protect the homes of over 30 species at risk, and so much more.

Today, only 4,405 acres remain until our goal of 30,000 acres is met! This achievement would not have been possible without your belief in the necessity of Nova Scotia's natural legacy and the Nature Trust's ability to best protect it. Early Twin Win

Spectacle and Peases Islands were two of Twice the Wild's earliest successes within a globally-significant island chain where the Nature Trust now protects nearly 800 acres.



Rarity on the Bras d'Or

Plaister Cliffs is on the Bras d'Or, an area known for fragile and fascinating karst landscape. Karst features are threatened in Nova Scotia, and with approximately 90% of sites on private land, the Nature Trust is crucial to saving these unique habitats.

High at Lowland Cove

Showcasing the best of Cape Breton's coastal mountains and wilderness, Lowland Cove is one of the last 'inholdings' within the Polletts Cove-Aspy Fault Wilderness Area and a key link in the iconic Seawall Trail.



Lac de l'Ecole

This property along the Tusket River provides habitat for rare Atlantic Coastal Plain Flora and likely the only place left in the province where Long's Bulrush produces flowers.

More for the St. Mary's

So far, Twice the Wild added another eight properties along this beloved river. In all, provincial and Nature Trust conservation lands there now exceed 11,000 acres!



A Fresh Focus

Our Acacia Valley Conservation Lands south of Digby in the Kesputkwitk district represent an exciting first in a part of the province where little is currently protected.



Little Charles

This ecologically diverse 24-acre island is often referred to as the "crown jewel" of the 100 Wild Islands.

Connecting in Canso

The protection of Harbour and Prices Islands is new for the Nature Trust in this area. Relatively less developed, the Canso Coastal Barrens has huge conservation potential, particularly as a pristine refuge for birdlife.
